











































Victim Recognition: Visible Signs

Reporting Processes

Reporting Mechanisms for **Healthcare Professionals**

- For minors, call police immediately
- Generally use the local Non-Emergency number
- - Obtain consent and call police or hotline together
 - If they refuse consent, provide informational resources for them

 - National Human Trafficking Hotline
 Local Task Force, shelter, non-profits, churches
